Scientists have studied how people <u>react</u> to <u>colors</u>, and home decorators have used that information. Light colors make rooms seem brighter. Dark colors increase the <u>sense of intimacy</u>. Red raises energy levels and makes people want to talk. Yellow makes people feel happier. Blue is relaxing and <u>encourages rest</u>. Colors affect people in many ways. People make their homes beautiful by choosing colors that <u>reflect their personalities</u>. The next time you feel like you want a change, <u>why not try painting your house?</u>

M Some colleges are expensive, while others are not. In the US, a two-year college may only cost \$1,500 per year. A public four-year college averages around \$7,000 per year. Private colleges cost the most. The average tuition at a private college is around \$20,000. The top universities may be as high as \$50,000. Students who want to live on campus have to pay even more. The cost of room and board is usually one-third of the tuition cost. Most students get loans and jobs to help cover the costs. Some also receive scholarships and grants.
